*ES* will be pleased to receive contributions **preferably in English**. All articles submitted should follow the MLA guidelines <<http://www.mla.org>>. Contributions should be accompanied by a 10 line summary in two languages, one of them English (abstract), as well as key words which describe the article contents in two languages (one of them should be English). It should have a maximum extension of 20 DIN-A4 double spaced or 45.000 characters. *ES* warmly recommends that all articles be submitted as RTF (Rich Text Format) typescripts on PC diskette, or in Microsoft Word (Windows 98 or latest version) or by e-mail. Articles should be sent together with two print-outs ready for external and internal masked review, i.e. without indication of authorship.

Works accepted by *ES* may not be included in other publications without written permission of the editors.

Book reviews are also welcome.

Deadline for submissions: **1st March 2008**.

Acceptance of originals: **1st May 2008**.

***Gramma. Journal of Theory and Criticism***. Issue 17 (2009): *The Text Strikes Back: The Dynamics of Performativity*.

The 20<sup>th</sup>-century theatre has witnessed the gradual decline of verbocentric drama in favour of the image, the performing body and, more recently, the digital and media technology. Concomitantly, the playwright has gradually been superceded as the

initiator of theatrical creation by the director, the performer or the composer of a hybrid media spectacle. From Artaud's infamous condemnation of playwrights as the reptiles of the theatre, through Barthes's announcement of the death of the author, to Lehmann's more recent claim for a state of postdramatic theatre, theorists have also been working towards the demise of both the written dramatic text and its skilled artistic producer, the playwright. However, after many years of a theatrical praxis that has denied the artistic value of words in contemporary theatre, there has been a reevaluation of such absolute distrust and rejection of language from the stage. The power of words to heighten sensory perception and refine the mental processes of audience reception has now been recognized and many contemporary playwrights show a renewed ability to use words phenomenologically and reconstitute their performative effectiveness. Obviously the word is finding a new function in today's theatre and the playwright is negotiating a new meaningful position in the complex contemporary reality of infinite theatrical possibilities.

Issues to be tackled on the above problematics could indicatively be:

- the "postdramatic" playwright;
- authorship / authority / auteurism;
- word versus image;
- collaborative theatre;
- devising text / adapting text;
- the body as text;
- performing and un-forming the word;
- hyperstage / hypertext;
- the virtual, the corporeal and the symbolic in the art of theatre;
- playwriting in the electronic media age;
- narrative and poetry into performance;
- the way(s) and politics of adaptation; and
- theatrescapes / wordscapes.

Papers should not exceed the length of 7,000 words (including footnotes and bibliography) and should be double-spaced. They should adhere to the latest MLA style of documentation and should be submitted electronically in the form of Word document to the editors of the issue, Savas Patsalidis and Elizabeth Sakellaridou, at the following e-mail addresses: <[spats@enl.auth.gr](mailto:spats@enl.auth.gr)> and <[esakel@enl.auth.gr](mailto:esakel@enl.auth.gr)>. The deadline for submissions is **31 December 2008**.

Perhaps most evident in the proliferation of neo-Victorian novels, the trend is also discernible in a recent abundance of nineteenth century biographies, the continuing allure of art movements such as the Pre-Raphaelites, popular Victoriana in film and television adaptations, historical re-evaluations in the fields of medicine, psychology and sexology, and the political recycling of 'Victorian values'. Neo-Victorian Studies provides a strategic forum to analyse the complicated investments of our own centuries in historical revision and deconstruction, to engage creatively with Victorian models and precedents, and to stimulate international debate and exchange of ideas in this flourishing field of critical and artistic endeavour.

The editors invite submissions for the inaugural issue of Neo-Victorian Studies, to be published April 2008, on any topic related to the exploration of the nineteenth century from a twenty/twenty-first century perspective by creative artists and researchers in the Arts and Humanities, as well as practitioners of other disciplines whose work specifically engages with the period's contemporary legacies. Please note: The terms 'Victorian' and 'neo-Victorian' are employed in the widest possible senses, so as not to be restricted to geographical British contexts or those of the British Empire and its one-time colonies. Essays and/or creative pieces dealing with nineteenth century African, Asian, North and South American contexts, among others, are equally welcome.

Possible topics include, but are not limited to:

- theorising the neo-Victorian novel;
- intertextual / intervisual negotiations with the past;
- the legacies of nineteenth century sexual politics;
- the biographical imagination;
- the fascinations of criminality;
- spectrality and spiritualism;
- re-imagining empire;
- rewriting medical histories; and
- the sense of place.

A fully peer-reviewed journal, *Neo-Victorian Studies* is committed to scholastic and artistic excellence. All papers and creative pieces considered for publication are reviewed on an anonymous basis by two members of the editorial team, with research specialisms in the relevant subject areas.

### **Special issue of *Revista Alicantina de Estudios Ingleses* on New Trends in Cross-Cultural Communication Studies**

*Revista Alicantina de Estudios Ingleses (RAEI)* is an international Journal of English Studies published annually since 1988 by the University of Alicante (Spain). Although many of its volumes deal with miscellaneous topics of interest for researchers in English Studies, it has also published several special issues on English language teaching (1991), Anglo-Irish literature (1992), relevance theory (1998), pragmatics and translation (2001), new literatures in English (2003) and linguistics and the media (2006).

*RAEI* is currently preparing another special issue on New Trends in Cross-cultural Communication Studies edited by Dr. Victoria Guillén, Dr. Chelo Vargas and Judith Williams from the University of Alicante. We would like to invite scholars who are doing research in this field to participate in this interdisciplinary volume which is due to appear in December 2008.

New Trends in Cross-Cultural Communication will cover six broad areas:

1. Social anthropology and cross-cultural communication;
2. Social psychology and cross-cultural communication;
3. Pragmalinguistics and cross-cultural communication;
4. Interlanguage pragmatics;
5. Social etiquette and non-verbal communication in cross-cultural studies; and
6. Information technologies and computer simulation for cross-cultural training.

As shown above, each area will focus on the study of cross-cultural communication from a distinctive approach, i.e. social anthropology, social psychology, pragmalinguistics, non-verbal behaviour, ICT, computer simulation, and cross-cultural training.

Any contributions from any of the above-mentioned perspectives will be welcome for this special issue on cross-cultural communication. Manuscripts should be written in English, not exceed 12,000 words, and be submitted no later than 30th April 2008. All papers submitted to *RAEI* should be original, unpublished research, and not be currently under evaluation elsewhere.
